| <b>Cued American English</b> (noun)<br>(as introduced and described by Fleetwood and Metzger, 1998) | visual              | cueing              | head thrust, eyebrow movement, non-manual signals (including facial expression) and other visual suprasegmental/prosodic elements (to indicate e.g. rhythm, duration, stress) that serve grammatical and pragmatic functions; cuem specific to Cued American English   | American English, (exclusively in the visual medium)                             |
